

Arthur Hulstunson 12-13-35

Tan Walker, hester Palmer and Marion Boone  
about 1877 killed man and woman  
cattle thieves near Freegold.

Jim Rich, now of Denver, was first  
white child born around here. He was  
born at Poucha. (UNCLE ART BORN HERE NOV. 16 1870.)

James C. Maxwell, father of Mrs  
Burnell, grandfather of Alf, was first  
white man to die here. He was  
buried Dec. 31 1870 ~~where~~ on present  
Lewis Hollenbeck place. — About 50

or 60 buried there including Coyad the  
world famous foot racer. Killman  
beat him in race near Salida. Coyad  
died soon after under suspicious circum-  
stances, thought to have been poisoned  
before the race. Joseph S. Hutchinson buried there and later  
reburied at Poucha.  
Salida also buried up there, tel Cleora  
and Woodland started. Hollenbeck place  
was 1st cemetery.

William O'Folke famous old  
stage driver on plains in the states died  
and was buried at Hollenbeck but  
later moved to Poucha Cemetery.

Hugh Boones father James Boone and  
Hugh's mother Tamer Boone are both  
buried at Poucha. SAM BOONE, DAVE BOONE, AND UNCLE FINLEY  
KANE <sup>BE</sup> BURIED SIDE BY SIDE IN POUCHA - MOVED FROM HOLLENBECK'S  
The Bradens built the log house in Poucha  
now occupied by Beck's

Pitt Cook, nephew of Jay Cook, bought  
the present Seanga house  
J. Scott Boyd was great friend of Wm J.

Palmer of Red Grande. Boyd + Dennis  
owned place <sup>across</sup> Little River. Palmer  
on trip in <sup>present</sup> special <sup>Denver</sup> car would stop and  
visit Boyd. On trip Palmer asked for a  
name for present <sup>man</sup> ranch. Boyd  
said call it Monarch. He did
