Summer Mountain Resiliency Course and Info Session: The Center for Environment & Sustainability and Extended Studies are excited to announce a new international, field-based summer semester course. ENVS 397: Mountain

Resiliency will take a group of undergraduate students from the Gunnison Valley to the Himalayas of India to explore resiliency across diverse mountain communities. The importance of traditional knowledge systems, socioecological relationships, and spiritual connectedness to landscapes will be explored through a place-based resiliency curriculum. Beginning in the Gunnison Valley, the class will investigate how sustainability and resiliency are being cultivated in our community. After a week of field experiences in Gunnison, the class will then travel to two mountain communities in the Himalayas of India, learning about the region, the culture, and a variety of sustainable development issues. Experiential learning will emphasize the interdependence and interconnectedness between individuals, their community, and natural systems. This course is an opportunity to embark a field-based exploration of the larger themes and subtle nuances of resiliency, with the Gunnison Valley and the Himalayas of India as two cross-cultural classrooms.
